




Lake-Lehman Community

Start Times

When looking at this year's school calendar and calendars from previous years, Brianna Wright and I noticed that our start date has been consistently later than in years prior. We took this issue to Mr. Kostrobala, then to Mrs. Liparella, and finally to the school board. By changing the school start date to before Labor Day, Lake-Lehman School District can provide students with an earlier end date and allow possible additional break time during the school year, specifically, the possibility for a longer spring break. Starting on August 27th would permit us to end school in early June. This would also allow more leeway for snow-day makeup, give seniors an earlier graduation date, and enable Lake-Lehman students to start and end school at the same time as surrounding local schools. However, most importantly, this would provide more time for students to prepare for AP, Keystone, SAT, and PSSA testing, allow better and sooner prospects for students to get summer jobs and internships, and allow more 🚓 opportunities for student-athletes. As the editor-in-chief of Knightlife newspaper, I put out 2 separate polls to get other students' thoughts on the matter and collect information that could be used now and in future articles. 108 students responded to the first poll and when asked about the start date, 54.6% of students said that they would rather start before Labor Day Weekend. These statistics lead me to believe that these statistics accurately reflect the faculty and the rest of the student body that didn't respond to the poll. Likewise, in the 2nd poll, students were asked if they would rather start earlier and have more break time during the school year or start later and have the same amount of break time. Both of these options would result in the same amount of time spent in the building and the same last day of school. Despite this, 69.2% of students from the follow-up poll said that they would rather start earlier and have more break time embedded into the school year. Starting before the Labor Day Weekend provides all students with greater opportunities in and out of school as displayed by the main points listed above. In February Brianna and I spoke to the school board about the topic and more recently the district put out their own poll to collect information from parents on the topic. 


Funny Bunny Business

A Historical Bloom



The snow has surrounded Lake-Lehman these past days. As nature finally awakens in late March, the nation's capital blooms with pink and white. This iconic event symbolizes the arrival of spring and embodies the spirit of renewal and beauty. The history of Washington's cherry blossoms traces back to 1912 when the Mayor of Tokyo gifted 3,000 cherry trees to the city as a symbol of friendship between Japan and the United States. Today, the trees blossom every year at the same time and lighten the city with colors. The National Cherry Blossom Festival, held annually, serves as a celebration of this natural wonder. The sight of the cherry trees in bloom against the backdrop of the Jefferson Memorial or Washington Monument is truly a sight to behold.

History teacher, Mr Novrocki, enjoys the beauty of these trees along the Tidal Basin. Mr Novrocki talks about this event very highly as he truly admires the history these trees bring. He states, "This stretch has a breathtaking beauty all of its own and you can't help but feel the greatness of the history that surrounds the place." It all started in 2004, as he says, "My desire to see the cherry blossoms stemmed from the fact that most years since 2004, I have accompanied the Senior Class on their class trip to Washington, D.C. We would usually be on this trip about 2-3 weeks after the blossoms fell off the trees."



He further explains the beauty of the trees that had always seen and knew he had to see them at peak. The peak bloom period, when the cherry blossoms are at their most pigmented, is anticipated each year. This was a big challenge for him as mother nature takes her course in bloom season. He states, "I kept monitoring the situation, and then saw that peak bloom came on St. Patrick's Day this year, six days before the prediction, and this was the second earliest peak bloom on record since the dates have been recorded. I checked the weather, and made a plan to get down there just a few days after peak bloom began. I knew that any rain, excessively high winds, or snow could bring the whole thing to an immediate end." With this he made every effort to make a day trip for these trees! "I know that when I walk that stretch along the Tidal Basin with our Seniors on the trip this year, it will be special. For the first time, I will be able to actually visualize from memory what the trees looked like in bloom. And I might be able to encourage someone else to take part in this cultural history and see the blooms for themselves.", Novrocki explains.

Last year, I took his passion to heart and had the opportunity myself to see the beauty in bloom. I believe it creates a start to feel the spring air. If you have the chance, I highly recommend taking a day trip to the city of its origin. It's truly a blooming experience.

A Game Changing Future for College Athletes

Many individuals avidly support college sports, whether by purchasing tickets for games, streaming them via phone or TV, or buying merchandise. However, often overlooked is the significant revenue generated by these events, encompassing ticket sales, sponsorships, and TV deals, all benefiting the colleges and their athletic conference such as the Big Ten and Pac-12. Not to mention, the networks broadcasting the games profit substantially from the commercials. Meanwhile, coaches are paid millions of dollars for their coaching skills. This dynamic raises questions about fairness, particularly as college athletes themselves are not compensated. Without their participation, these events would not be possible.

Under the National Collegiate Athletic Association (N.C.A.A.) rules, college athletes are prohibited from receiving payment from the schools or earn money using their name, image, or likeness through endorsement deals. However, a significant shift may be on the horizon as California recently enacted the Fair Pay to Play Act. This law allows athletes in the state of California to strike endorsement deals and hire agents. While this legislation presents opportunities for student athletes, it also introduces potential drawbacks, notably creating an uneven playing field for recruiting, as athletes may gravitate toward California schools to capitalize on earning potential. California could be the first of many to start a widespread change in the world of college sports.




