# The Journey of My First Voting Experience Janaya Yusko, Senior

My birthday has never felt more special than the first year everything changed. My 18th birthday is unique this year. I turned an adult the day before the 2024 presidential election on November 4th. Gratefully, with early registration, I can cast a vote this year making sure I was registered to earn my voice as a citizen for the very first time. Voting is a relatively significant moment in empowerment and responsibility of connection to something bigger than myself. This moment carried more weight for me because of my mom's career. She is the head of Nurse Practitioners of Women's Health in Geisinger reassuring the safety of women. Growing up, I saw how deeply she cared about advocating for women's accessible health care. Her work shaped my understanding of the importance of equality and safety through supportive healthcare. Next year I am attending Lincoln University to play softball. This is the first historically black college and university to grant degrees in the nation. I am blessed to say I have a personal connection to HBCU's institutions for my pride in inclusive learning, leadership opportunities and support from the national government. Vice President Kamala Harris, a fellow graduate of an HBCU, is the first Black and South Asian woman on a major party ticket. This made my first vote more than just a civic duty but a celebration of identity, heritage, and culture. It wasn't just a vote for me, it was the greatest birthday gift I could ask for, a step towards progress, equality, and representation. The kind of world I want to help build.

When we arrived, President Reagan had been called away so instead we met with Vice-President George H. W. Bush. He would later become the 41st. President of the United States. There were six members from the club who had made the trip and he spent about 25-30 minutes speaking to us the way you would speak to your neighbor on a summer afternoon at the back fence.

We had intended to donate the chairs to the White House to be used by visitors who needed assistance. Mr. Bush said he was scheduled to meet with delegates in one of our neighboring Central American countries and asked if he could donate the chairs to them as a goodwill gesture. Of course we said yes.

Before we left he gave each of us a small box containing cuff links bearing the vice-presidential seal. He told us to please open the boxes there because in the previous week, he gave out boxes to a foreign delegation, but was embarrassed when they discovered the boxes were empty! Ooops!




