

Last April, I had the incredible opportunity to compete at Penn State University at the Pennsylvania School Press Association State Competition in the category editorial cartoon. After qualifying at regionals at Bloomsburg University, I was very excited to compete again. But my experience was entirely different, and it opened my eyes to the importance of the press (like Knightlife) in schools today.

A departure from regionals, states begin with a press conference hosted by different figureheads at Penn State University. At Bloomsburg, I arrived and almost immediately began competing. However, the importance of this press conference at States was that it highlighted students' First Amendment rights to the freedom of speech and press in school journalism. After the conference I went into a nearby classroom and opened my prompt, beginning the competition. My prompt was to draw a cartoon about a topic spoken about during the press conference. I drew a cartoon detailing a student asking to write an article, but a principal refused to send it to print. A month later, I was awarded my plaque for first place-State champion in Editorial Cartoon,

I believe journalism is incredibly important in schools, and a student's Freedom of Speech should never be denied. 
Mrs. Ruddy, our 10th English teacher, concurs that the class would be beneficial because of how important it is for students to take advantage of studying for standardized tests. After seeing the recent spike in colleges re-requiring the SAT, she's made it a point to stress the importance of preparation in her own 10th-grade classroom. "I saw that even with my own son, now in the college application process, so many kids have that 4.0 GPA range. So, the SAT is a very important factor in how colleges set students apart. It's another filter for colleges to choose the right students."

She, as well as many other staff, students, and parents, would like to see an SAT-prep course be offered as scheduling is right around the corner. This course must be only offered to those who are interested, as many students will never take a standardized test as a part of the college application process. Likewise, with so many electives that are put in front of students every year that never get filled, a rotational period that alternates with a lab or study hall could be the easiest solution. By the time junior year rolls around, SATs are in full swing with test dates through the fall months and into spring. Lehman must send students into these tests with full preparation in order for our Knights to shine in the college application process and make an impact on universities.






S.A.D.D. Club
