Us: "What do you like about Lake-Lehman so far?"

Mr. Matusick: "I like how small Lake Lehman is and how most of the students know each other. The teachers know their students and are aware of students' families, siblings, and schedules. I like that students are taken care of and on track."

Us: "What inspired you to teach history?"

Mr. Matusick: "I got my degree in early childhood education and special education. I got a degree to teach English and math at WVW. I have an interest in teaching all curricula, especially English and history. I enjoy the history aspects with dedicated teachers like Mr. Lindbuchler. I'm excited to join a great group of history teachers and see what I can add to the history department. I've always had personal interest in teaching and I just knew I wanted to teach at a secondary level. History landed in my lap and I am happy to explore it. Although I didn't look to become a history teacher, I have personal interests in history. I got an overall degree in education. I'm excited to see where it takes me."

Us: "What is your role as a history teacher at Lake-Lehman?"

I teach one class myself for history, and for the remainder, I co-teach special education. I meet with the kids with IEPs and I help the students in 10th grade at Lehman. I make sure their IEPs are up to date, that they aren't behind, and that their accommodations are met."



Us: "Do you have a favorite historical event or time period that you'd like to teach?"

Mr. Matusick: "This is my introduction to teaching history, so I don't really have anything specific yet. I enjoy learning about ancient cultures, like the Ancient Egyptians. There's so much we don't know about them, so I'm excited to teach in that area, get more involved, and learn more myself."

Us: "If you weren't a history teacher what would you be doing?"

Mr. Matusick: "I've worked in a lot of different jobs since I got out of high school. I have taught everything from preschool, special needs, high school, and adults with special needs. I think I would still do something involving teaching or mentoring. Whether it would be coaching or alternative-based education. I also love teaching at the farm and getting hands-on experience with students. I would really get more into the farm if I wasn't in the classroom."

Band Fest Comes to Lake-Lehman



Jimmy finished with an impressive 32-6 record in his senior year. He finished 2nd at districts and 4th in regionals--a strong finish for a strong senior on the mat.




GIRLS BASKETBALL
