HOW DOES SCHEDULING ACTUALLY WORK?

With every new school year there comes a time to see new friends, learn new things, and have new teachers. However, upon our return to school this year, students saw some scheduling mishaps, leading everyone to wonder if there had been a glitch. I talked to Mrs. Molino and Mrs. Pohonche about how scheduling works in order to dive deeper and better understand the issue.

The first step in the scheduling process is course requesting. At the end of last school year, students were called down alphabetically by grade to select the classes they would be taking next year. For high school students, this also means choosing AP or honors classes, electives and alternate electives. This is how it is decided whether or not there are enough students in a class to run it. For junior high students, this process is selecting chorus or band along with the option of honors or regular courses. Mrs. Molino shared that the course requests are inputted into the system by hand, and then the system generates an algorithm. The high school schedules are completed before junior high due to the amount of students. The algorithm decides what works best where; for both students and teachers. Elective issues are started here. This is all a computer generated process, and the ten day period once school starts is used for humans to manually override any computer generated errors. Since students have a different view of the system, there were also consistency errors throughout the student-parent view and the administration view, causing more confusion and worry. The study halls are also computer generated. This year specifically, there was an error with that system which caused required classes to be bumped off schedules in favor of study halls.

The majority of major scheduling issues were resolved in less than five days. Since correcting the schedules is a process that must be done by hand, it took some time to correct. We are thankful that the guidance department and the rest of the administration fixed these issues in a timely manner, and we hope to have a smooth rest of our school year in regards to scheduling!


GIRLS SOCCER






FIELD HOCKEY


18 year olds can register in Pennsylvania from this link

IT ENDS WITH US


