Meritorious Inductee into the Class of 2016 Mr. William M. Jones

As President and CEO of the United Way of Wyoming Valley, Bill has lead some transformational changes in how the nearly 100 year old organization serves the community. The United Way of Wyoming Valley is now leading the community's efforts to address and reduce childhood poverty which impacts more than 11,500 children; nearly one out of every three children under the age of 18 in the Wyoming Valley. The organization is leading significant work in improving early childhood education, grade level reading initiatives, graduation rates and reducing child abuse and neglect.

Bill has been responsible for leading four annual fundraising campaigns for The United Way of Wyoming Valley totaling \$14.4 million since 2012. He reestablished an Investment Committee to oversee the agency's \$12 million endowment and led the process to improve the management of these funds at substantially reduced fees. He also created a partnership with the Dolly Parton Foundation to bring the Imagination Library to the Wyoming Valley and increased visibility of the organization through social media and a redesigned website.

Previously, for twelve years as Vice President and CEO of Volunteers of America of PA, Bill championed efforts to address homelessness, mental illness, at-risk youth, elderly services and other programs for vulnerable populations. Bill helped the agency's revenue base grow from \$3.5 million in 2000 to \$7.4 million in 2011 and completely eliminated the agency's debt. He also provided oversight on the development of the Palmer House, a \$3.3 million affordable housing project and led an \$800,000 capital campaign effort to upgrade the Children's Center (a child care facility) and provided the leadership for the Dial-A-Driver transportation program to more than double in capacity and service. Bill also developed the agency's pantry for low income mothers and babies and developed the Manna House, a successful transitional housing program for homeless young adults. He helped secure public funding at the federal, state and local levels to develop and grow and ensure sustainability for a number of new services to meet local needs. Bill developed the Family Thrift Store in Wilkes-Barre as an entrepreneurial initiative to offset government funding cuts. He also led and managed 15 special events for fundraising and branding purposes and strengthened the agency's relationships with the Luzerne County Office of Human Services, other non-profit social service providers; community leaders and the donor community.
